



Connor* was a junior in high school when his mother noticed a change in his eating, sleeping, mood, and a drop in grades. She found him crying in his room on several occasions but couldn't get him to talk about what was upsetting him.

She called ACS' After-School Counseling Program to see if we could help Connor. The first step was getting him to come to counseling. ACS worked with his mom on ways to get him to come just once. When he first met with his ACS therapist, Connor was withdrawn, angry, hated living at home, and wanted to "get high school over with and move away." His ACS therapist convinced him to return for more sessions and began to build a relationship with Connor that helped him open up.

Connor longed for a relationship with his father who was never home—travelling constantly for work. Connor's anger turned to sadness over the next several weeks. He was aware that his parents were talking about divorce and during this time, his girlfriend broke up with him. His ACS counselor began to assess Connor for depression and saw him twice a week. Connor was given support and education on topics of grief, anger, and abandonment. With Connor's permission, our counselor met with his parents to discuss Connor's feelings of sadness regarding the family situation.

His father was unaware that Connor was so affected by his absence. His parents understood his concern over their marital conflict and were given tips on how to discuss this with Connor. Connor has started spending more time with his father and has continued in therapy to understand his feelings and learn to communicate his anger and sadness.



Gabriel* was 16 when he came to America from El Salvador to live with his uncle. Soon after arriving, his uncle moved them to Connecticut to work in a factory; but he was able to attend school, learn English, and apply for a green card.

A year ago he moved, by himself, from Connecticut to San Jose, CA. He moved in with the only friend he knew in San Jose, but felt isolated since he was not living openly as a gay man and lacked a community with whom he could be himself.

Eventually he met Hector*, a regular attendee of Outlet's De Ambiente group, who invited Gabriel to attend the weekly De Ambiente meeting. Six months later, Gabriel has made many friends who share his experience of being a young, gay, Spanish-speaking immigrant.

Although his coming out process with his family is still in progress, he knows he has a community that supports him and validates who he is.

With four comprehensive programs that complement one another, Adolescent Counseling Services (ACS) is proud to be the emotional and mental health hub for ALL adolescents on the Peninsula. Having all of these services—counseling on-campus and off, substance abuse treatment, LGBTQQ support groups, and education—under one organization, makes getting individualized care for young people easier to navigate. With our current program line-up and increased offerings for LGBTQQ youth through the addition of the Outlet Program, I think back to my teenage years and reflect on how much I would have benefitted from ACS.

We served 9,558 individuals in the 2013-2014 school year through the On-Campus Counseling (OCC) Program, Adolescent Substance Abuse Treatment (ASAT) Program, After-School Counseling Program, and Outlet Program. All four programs experienced growth last fiscal year: the OCC Program served 7% more clients than the previous year; Outlet served 14% more; the After-School Counseling Program served 26% more; and the ASAT Program increased by 1%.

The OCC Program continued services at our existing partner schools and expanded to our ninth site (and first private school), Kehillah Jewish High School. Outlet expanded into downtown San Mateo thanks to a partnership with Junior Gym to use their offices after hours. Outlet also added groups in Palo Alto at the ACS offices and on-campus at Gunn, Paly, and Woodside High Schools. Our partnership with the Boys & Girls Clubs of the Peninsula boosted our ability to help more youth in the After-School Counseling Program. And while we served just a few more clients in the ASAT Program than we did the year before, we saw new challenges: far more complicated cases involving severe depression, changing attitudes about teenage use of marijuana, and experimentation with "Sizzurp" (a mix of soda, candy, and prescription cough syrup with codeine).

Thank you to everyone who makes this work possible. They say it takes a village and it truly does: interns, staff, boards, volunteers, donors, and community partners. None of our programs could happen without you. Thank you for your commitment to helping youth find their way!

Outlet


2013–2014 Financials

The condensed financial information on this page has been obtained from ACS' financial statements as of and for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2014. As a reasonable cost-saving measure, the ACS Board and Finance Committee have decided that ACS will undergo a full financial audit every second year, rather than on an annual basis. In light of the high level of engagement by our Finance Committee, the Board and Finance Committee view this as a prudent policy.

The \$92,000 deficit can be attributed to the following factors: 1. ACS experienced some staff turnover after the budget was approved and was not able to fill those positions at the same salary level they were originally budgeted for; 2) after an overhaul of ACS' accounting systems and processes, it was discovered that intern stipends were not budgeted accurately; and 3) the cost of employee benefits was higher as of 1/1/14 than what our insurance broker had estimated during the budgeting process in Spring/Summer 2013.


