spotlight on... PRIDE month!

Gay pride, or LGBT pride, is the positive stance against discrimination and violence toward lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBTQQ) people. It promotes their self-affirmation, dignity and equal rights, while increasing visibility as a social group to celebrate sexual and gender diversity. Pride, as opposed to shame and social stigma, is the predominant outlook that bolsters most LGBTQQ rights movements throughout the world. From the first pride event in 1970, events have ranged from solemn to "carnivalesque,"and are typically held during LGBTQQ Pride Month or some other period that commemorates a turning point in a country's LGBTQQ history.


The value of Pride is illustrated by this recollection from one of ACS/Outlet's supporters, who recalls participating in his first NYC Pride March 35 years ago in 1980. "I was overwhelmed with a sense of empowerment and self-assertion, yet also fear, knowing that if any of my bosses saw me marching, I could be fired. As we came within a block of the office building where I worked - a major international accounting firm - I was acutely aware of the performance evaluation I had recently been given, when they told me I was a splendid employee, and that they had no problem with my being gay, but they were concerned that clients might be troubled; so they asked me to 'tone things down'. Participating in the march was my response -- "You don't get to tell me who to be - I am PROUD of who and how I am."
